

INTERNATIONAL SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM FACT SHEET

EUROPEAN STUDIES SUMMER TRAVEL SCHOLARSHIP

I. Summer Break in Europe

- \$2000 scholarship (will cover partial travel expense, tuition and fees) or \$1333 if studying immediately before, after, or during the summer (you must pick a non-overlapping theme to your additional study or project).
- See Application for deadline!
- Up to 3 scholarships available; select one of the five following offerings:
 - Italy: The Italian Renaissance
 - Spain: The Islamic, Judaic, Christian Encounter
 - France: The French Revolution
 - Germany, Switzerland, & France: Luther and The Reformation
 - England: Oliver Cromwell
- For A&S juniors or seniors with GPA of 3.0 minimum
- Students should be returning for the fall semester
- Ten (10) day minimum stay excluding travel days to/from Europe
- Required to enroll in an Independent Study 395 for credit
- Team travel encouraged, but not required

II. Special Requirement Notes for Above Travel Scholarship:

- Each grant recipient is responsible for planning, including being knowledgeable of opening and closing days and hours of each site, and budgeting his/her trip. Please be aware the scholarship money provided may not cover the entire expense.
- Please note the specific sites, cities and requirements for each scholarship.
- GPA requirement of 3.0 (verified as of date of grant application).
- No later than 30 days post travel, the recipients must submit a portfolio or scrapbook documenting visits (photos, sketches, postcards, entrance receipts, tickets, etc.) to the Arts & Sciences Advising Center at 202 Patterson Office Tower
- No scholarship funds may be used for cancellation or other similar fees.
- All undergraduate students must be enrolled in ISP 599. This course charges one credit hour of tuition at the student's normal rate (in-state or out-of-state). You must also register for an Independent Study 395.

- Citizens of the United States are required to have a valid U.S. Passport in order to enter a foreign country and to re-enter the U.S.
- The United States Department of State (www.state.gov/travel) issues travel warnings, public announcements, and consular information sheets that can help you identify possible safety and security issues for the countries you are considering for study abroad.
