Secrets of Leading Successfully in Academic Environments

Good and successful leaders possess the following skills and characteristics:

- 1.) They are trustworthy. Trust is essential for leaders. To be trustworthy, you must be:
  - a. Reliable.
    - i. Finish what you start.
    - ii. Learn to master your small commitments.
  - b. Honest.
    - i. Put a lantern on your mistakes.
  - c. A person of good faith.
    - i. Don't be creepy.
    - ii. Nice vs. polite. Being nice takes work.
    - iii. Thank people for their work and mean it.
  - d. You are vulnerable.
    - i. You have something to lose and realize that it takes contribution from both sides for things to work.
  - e. You are competent.
    - i. Don't over-promise.
- 2.) They are good story tellers.
  - a. Stories define us (families, businesses, etc.).
  - b. Stories are great ways to communicate rules.
    - i. They help people understand.
    - ii. They follow the same grammar world-wide.
      - 1. They are short.
      - 2. They have a point.
      - 3. They have value (you have to care about it).
    - iii. Use stories or factoids to communicate values, good vs. bad, etc.
- 3.) Leaders create loyalty.
  - a. Spontaneous rewards take work and planning but pay off.
  - b. Make yourself important to the people who matter.
  - c. Appreciate what people do even if it isn't what you want.
  - d. Show up to things that matter to people (i.e. funerals).
- 4.) Leaders have a strong sense of purpose.
  - a. Motivate by the result.
  - b. Believe in the thing (whatever that is: students, helping others, etc.).
- 5.) They exude optimism.
  - a. Reframe things. Perception makes a difference.
  - b. Label things differently. Also impactful.

Make sure people aren't disappointed, and realize that if you do all of these things as a leader, you are "working for tips."
